ABOUT THE SURVEY

The Collaborative on Academic Careers in Higher Education (COACHE) Faculty Job Satisfaction Survey was administered to all Emory full-time faculty members in the spring of 2023 in partnership with COACHE. Approximately 38% of Emory University faculty members completed the survey. However, **Emory's response rate excluding the School of Medicine** is 55%. Emory's participation in COACHE advances strategic priorities relating to Pillars 1 and 2 of the *university strategic framework*, and it captures many of interests identified by faculty in the Class & Labor II report.

RESPONSE RATES (with headcounts of respondents by self-identified group)


Response Rates by Rank

Response Rates by **Gender**






